- The impacts of the technology skills shortage and creating an understanding of potential impacts to software development should be acknowledged in the strategy; and
- Enabling Digital Service Providers (DSPs) to leverage the Digital Identity Trust Framework will be important as more and more government and business processes are digitised.

Enabling innovation

The one theme missing from this discussion paper is the key role that innovation has to play in the digital future of New Zealand. Innovation should be an underlying theme of the strategy given that it will help to foster the other themes outlined in the paper - trust, inclusion and growth.

To reflect the importance of innovation, we recommend re-working the key themes to include innovation alongside trust and inclusion and having growth depicted as an output of the three themes. Essentially we see growth resulting from trust, inclusion and innovation.

This strategy should also examine, and have a focus on, how we can enable a culture of innovation in New Zealand.

Partner with the software industry

From our perspective, the Government partnering with industry on key initiatives is the foundation for the strategy's success. Working with the software industry will be vital to the success of government policies and ensuring that workable outcomes are created for the Government, software providers and end users. This involves engaging DSPs as early as possible in the policy process to understand potential impacts and develop reasonable timelines for implementation.

Digital Service Providers (DSPs) have made progress in this space through the creation of the New Zealand Digital Advisory Group (NZ DAG) which is co-chaired by DSPANZ and the Inland Revenue Department. The DAG will work through items such as annual tax time changes, introducing security frameworks to the DSP ecosystem, producing a service management model for IRD and other related work.

Technology sector skills shortage

The current skills shortage in the technology sector is having a major impact on being able to develop software in a timely and cost effective manner. As this strategy will rely on developing or enhancing digital solutions, it will be important to create awareness and manage the expectations of government and industry around the potential impacts on the cost and pace of development. The strategy should also explore short options to address shortage.

Digital identity

Digital identity will play an increasingly important role as more and more government and business processes are digitised. Many DSPs would be interested in being able to access digital identity services for business transactions such as individuals using a solution to securely log in to their accounting software. Allowing software developers, especially smaller developers, to leverage the Digital Identity Trust Framework is a great way to provide affordable access while also uplifting the security across this ecosystem.
